On behalf of all of the students in our 17 Secondary Schools and 4 Schools of Special Education, I want to thank you personally for the support and financial assistance which you have offered over the past year. Your ongoing generosity helps our students continue to thrive in a Catholic school. While there is no price which can be placed on the development of the human soul, your goodness aids in enriching the learning experience of our students year after year.

We are so very proud of all that has been achieved during this past school year. This year, the Senior Class of 2019 earned \$402,722,148 in scholarship and grant money. This is a record breaking amount to date. Among the Class of 2019 there were 28 National Merit Commended and Semi-Finalists and the Class of 2020 has 30 National Merit students in their ranks. We are so very proud of our graduates and rising seniors.

Throughout the year, our students have distinguished themselves in the extraordinary amount of hours of service in their schools and within their local communities. During this past summer, they have worked at Camp Caritas, to help younger students as they prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation. Philanthropically, our students raised over \$50,000 to support the 4 Schools of Special Education.

After school activities provide opportunities for students to apply lessons taught to real world problems. Each of the 17 high schools distinguished themselves by preparing for and entering a number of academic competitions. Here are just a few of a wide variety of academic areas where AOP students distinguished themselves:

- Archbishop Wood won the New York region Robotics championship.
- Archbishop Ryan 2019 Diocesan and Philadelphia Mathletes Champions for the 23rd time in 26 years.
- Bishop Shanahan won 1st Place in Governor Wolf's STEM competition with their Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Lifesaving Assistant (named CARLA).
- John W. Hallahan placed 1st in the Philadelphia Chemical Society's "Chemimagination" competition.
- Little Flower won 1st place in the St. Joseph's University Stock Market Challenge.
- Roman Catholic Mock Trial team placed 1st in the University of Pennsylvania competition.

These are only a few highlights of the outstanding academic achievements of our students. We are grateful, too, for friends of Catholic Education like you who help to keep our lamps of learning burning bright year after year. Thank you for your continued support on behalf of the teachers and students of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia.





Enrollment and Tuition Assistance

Throughout our schools, cost remains an obstacle for many who wish to receive a Catholic education. The chart below reflects the 2018-2019 academic year's financial need within our schools, and the financial aid we are able to provide through Archdiocesan tuition assistance programs and state tax credit dollars. 7,213 students applied for financial aid, with a total need of over \$48 million dollars. Awarding nearly \$15 million in assistance still leaves many students with unmet need. In the chart on the right, you will see the addition of scholarship packages. When we are able to leverage financial aid packages with merit-and-need-based scholarships, we are able to maximize the amount of support we provide to our students. This gets us closer to our goal, but we need more supporters like you to help keep Catholic education affordable in the Philadelphia region.

Bridging the Financial Gap

Through both EITC/OSTC tax credit dollars and merit-or-need-based scholarships, we have seen the impact donors can have on individual students. This year, an anonymous donor combined tax credit donations with financial aid packages and gave a \$3.2 million dollar gift through BLOCS to support students in our urban schools. This "Bridging the Gap" scholarship allowed eight of our urban schools an additional \$100,000 to award financial aid to the incoming freshman class, renewable for all four years of high school. This gift, intended to boost enrollment by being the last money awarded, was utilized to bridge the gap between a student's initial financial aid package and the family's ability to choose Catholic education as an affordable option. This has made a tremendous difference for our schools, families, and students. This gift represents the very real impact donors have in the lives of families throughout Philadelphia.





Ally McHugh, Little Flower Catholic High School for Girls Class of 2015 and Penn State University Class of 2019, was recently named to the Scholar All-America Team for the 2018-19 season by the College Swimming & Diving Coaches Association of America (CSCAA).

The award recognizes students that have achieved a grade point average of 3.50 or higher and competed at their respective NCAA/NAIA/NJCAA Swimming and Diving Championships. McHugh became the first swimmer in Penn State women's swimming and diving history to win an NCAA individual championship, capturing the 1650 freestyle at the 2019 NCAA Swimming & Diving Championships. The gold medal was her second NCAA medal overall, as she earned a silver in the same event at the 2018 NCAA Championships. A member of the U.S National Team, McHugh also won the women's 400 IM at the 2018 USA Swimming National Championships.





Gaining Steam in STEM

Throughout the Archdiocese, our individual high schools are focused on delivering increased opportunities in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) for our students. Their success in competition at the city, regional, and state level highlights the strength of these programs.

Engineering Fundamentals

For the past three years, students in Archbishop Wood's innovative STEM Education Program have been winning state-wide accolades for their creativity. In both 2017 and 2018, teams from Mr. McLemore's "Engineering Fundamentals" class have competed in the "Student Inventor Competition," sponsored by the Pennsylvania Education Technology Expo & Conference (PETE&C), placing 2nd in the state each year. This year, two Wood teams qualified for the state finals, out of only six teams to qualify state-wide. Regarding Archbishop Wood's STEM Education program, Principal Mary Harkins said, "Each year I have been amazed not only at the creativity of the students but also for the professional manner in which they present their inventions."

Governor's STEM Competition

For the second consecutive year, the Bishop Shanahan STEM Team won the Pennsylvania Governor's STEM Regional Competition. The competition challenged STEM teams to develop communication, problemsolving, critical thinking, and creativity skills to address the needs of Pennsylvanians. Their winning device, the Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Lifesaving Assistant (CRLA), improves the success rate of CPR. The CRLA portable device detects and monitors pressure and compression rates to assist administers of CPR, both trained and untrained. The official presentation team, Michael Gomba, Alana Pappas, David Carangan, Julia Hirs, and Brian Carangan, were recognized by the PA Senate and House of Representatives. Team



faculty advisor, John P. Janasik, PhD, supported the students in preparation for the competition.

Chemagination and CyberStart Competitions

John W. Hallahan students won 1st place in The Philadelphia Section of the American Chemical Society 2019 CHEMAGINATION contest. The contest asks student to imagine life 25 years in the future and write an article on an innovation that improves quality of life. Sophomores Monica Madya, Tiffany Lim, and Zora Nelson won the Alternative Energy Sources category. Sophomores Giovanna McKinley, Summer Dib, and Indreal Morris won for the New Materials category. Hallahan students also won 1st place in the Girls Go CyberStart competition. Girls Go CyberStart is a fun and interactive series of digital challenges designed to introduce students to the field of cybersecurity. Moderator Megan Magee works with the girls as they learn about exciting topics like cryptography, web vulnerabilities, Python, Linux and forensics.



Increasing STEM Exposure

Lansdale Catholic offers many STEM opportunities to their own students. In an effort to encourage younger students from area grade schools to explore the exciting fields related to STEM, the LC Science Department created a competition that challenges junior high students to use the engineering design process to solve a real world challenge. On January 16, LC hosted twelve local 7th and 8th grade teams for their Second Annual "Stem Wars" Competition.

Innovative Programming

Rising Starters

Rising Starters, an entrepreneurship pitch competition held by Drexel University and Donna De Carolis, Dean of the Close School of Entrepreneurship, offers high school students the opportunity to pitch their entrepreneurial ideas to a panel of judges for the chance to win a \$2,500 cash prize. Students learn how to develop an idea into a viable business model using a variety of effective techniques and how to present their ideas to a panel of judges over the course of this competition. The Archdiocesan high schools challenged their students to reach for new heights, develop an idea for a business, then pitch it to a panel of judges.

The purpose of the competition is to empower young people through entrepreneurship education and to encourage students to reach their full potential by experiencing entrepreneurial thinking. Students also develop organizational and public speaking skills. The winning teams/individuals from sixteen of our schools attended the final two rounds of the competition on May 13 on the campus of Drexel University. Led by moderator Stephanie DiBello, Aaron Parker and Michael Prieto from Bishop Shanahan were the winners of this year's competition. Parker and Prieto pitched their idea for a school saver app to assist in tracking school buses. The app would notify parents where the bus is and also assist in routing softwarefor the school districts.

Stock Market Success



The St. Joseph's University Stock Market Challenge is an outreach program to local schools based on a stock market game. Student teams competed against other teams both from their school as well as other schools to see who could achieve the highest return over the game period. Over 159 student teams worked within a portfolio on the EquitySim platform as they explored the world of the stock market. The students attempted to design investment strategies that could be profitable during the long term and then utilize those strategies making investment decision on the simulated platform.

The winning teams from 7 schools participated in presentations on April 30 at the SJU Haub School of Business. The student teams were evaluated on their choice of strategies, their ability to defend their choice in strategies, and their understanding of the economic factors that influenced the stocks in their portfolio. The winners were the team from Little Flower, Caitlin Allen and Miranda Lesher, under the direction of faculty adviser Tim McCartney.

Hands-On Learning Opportunities

Mercy Career & Technical High School opened a Virtual Reality (VR) Lab, which brought unique learning opportunities. Teachers in Biology, Business, Geoscience, Cosmetology, and Health Occupations have created lesson plans and utilize the VR Lab to provide 3D, hands-on learning that is adaptable to individual student needs. Computer Service Technician students played a large role in getting the VR Lab up and running. They were able to determine what computer requirements were needed to run the VR system, build the computers for the lab, and install hardware within the lab. Mercy students are instrumental in their own success, and are provided hands-on opportunities to get involved and succeed.



SERVING STUDENTS WITH

Special Needs

There are four schools of special education in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, for students with sensory disabilities and students with cognitive disabilities and on the autism spectrum. St. Lucy School for the Blind and Archbishop Ryan School for the Deaf serve students with sensory disabilities, teaching academic education and offering mainstream opportunities



with the co-located Holy Innocents School. St. Katherine School and Our Lady of Confidence School serve students with cognitive disabilities and autism spectrum disorder, offering life skills classes along with their academic program. These schools offer a uniquely Catholic special education for any family that desires it.

Archbishop Ryan School for the Deaf, which was founded in 1912, and Our Lady of Confidence School, St. Lucy School for the Blind, and St. Katherine School, all of which began in the 1950s, serve a population that was long ignored by mainstream educational opportunities. In the 1950s there was no law-mandated education for students with special needs in public schools, yet the Archdiocese listened to families that wanted equality for their students, in a Catholic school that provided a good education in a safe and nurturing environment for their students with special needs. It was not until 1975 when the Education for All Handicapped Children Act passed that public schools were offering special education services for students. The Archdiocese of Philadelphia was very progressive in the actions of building and supporting schools of special education.



Our challenge today is to continue to be leaders in special education. Our schools provide their students with a faith-based education, centered on allowing each student to reach their fullest potential. This is accomplished by the dedicated teachers and staff who diligently work to create Individual Educational Plans (IEPs) for each student, detailing their goals and successes. We also offer additional programs to supplement the life skills classes and academic education, such as Music Therapy, Behavioral Therapy, Dance and Movement Classes, and Job Training.

2018-2019 Highlights

New therapies and extra-curricular opportunities abounded for our students in 2018-2019.

Bocce Team Advances to State Championship in Its Inaugural Season

The Archbishop Carroll/St. Katherine School bocce team was one of just 12 teams across the state to qualify for the 2019 Unified Bocce Championship, which was hosted by the PIAA and Special Olympics of Pennsylvania. Coached by Mr. Ed Scanlon, a highly respected teacher at Archbishop Carroll, the team qualified for the

championship after capturing the Montgomery County Regional Championship. The Archbishop Carroll/St. Katherine's team was the first Unified Sports Catholic school team in the state of Pennsylvania.



Students at Archbishop Ryan School for the Deaf and St. Lucy School for the Blind performed "The Wizard of Oz" in April. In this innovative production, the main characters were simultaneously portrayed by two students, one deaf and one visually impaired. For each role, one student signed the dialogue and songs, while the other vocalized the lines. The experience

was moving for viewers, who were reminded that talent transcends disability, and was also designed to build the students' confidence. They loved the teamwork, the extracurricular participation, and sharing their talents with others.



After a small pilot program in 2017-2018, Faith in the Future offered music therapy at both Our Lady of Confidence and St. Katherine School for the 2018-2019 academic year, using MusicWorks, a certified music therapy provider. Through MusicWorks and two music therapists, each individual student received progress reports based on Behavior and Task Completion Indicators. All 120 students serviced at St. Katherine School and Our Lady of Confidence showed progress in decreased aggression, increased frustration tolerance, increased communication, and increased task completion. The students thoroughly enjoyed their time each week with Mr. Jake and Miss Schuyler, and their obvious confidence, communication, and excitement made these sessions more than just therapy – they were fun, too!
